Chair Ed Green called the meeting to order at **7:08pm**

1. Introduction of Committee Members and Guests

Roll Call of committee members. Committee members introduced themselves.

2. Approval of the April 21st, 2026, Public Safety Committee Minutes

The March 17th Public Safety Committee minutes were approved unanimously.

3. NYPD Report (*See attached NYPD CompStat Report, Quality of Life Team Report, Traffic Report) –

Captain Saburro read the NYPD CompStat report. Issues discussed:

- Homeless man killed in fight with another homeless man on #1 train at Van Cortlandt subway terminal at 242nd Street and Broadway. Incident occurred on 5/14/26 @3am. Alleged perpetrator with 22 previous arrests was a sleeping vagrant that was awakened by another homeless man. A fight ensued and the victim was beaten and choked to death. Suspect arrested and charged with manslaughter.

- 2 Resident complaints about a mentally ill man, allegedly living in section 8 housing on Oxford Avenue, that walks 2 large dogs, one off leash. The man often curses loudly at people, abuses both dogs verbally and physically, and has been involved in physical altercations initiated by him and his dogs, the most recent on 5/11/26 on Johnson Avenue which led to a 911 call, police and ambulance. Residents avoid walking on the same side of the street as the man and request his dogs be leashed at all times.
- Special Victims Unit now has an office in the 50th Precinct.
- 5 homicides in the 50th Precinct in 2026, compared to 1 homicide in 2025 (year to date).
- 16 members of a city-wide auto theft ring were arrested. Many of their crimes were committed in the BXCB8 area and included theft of cars, SUV's, rims, tires and catalytic converters. The group was linked to hundreds of thefts between 2024-present. Auto Crime Unit Detectives made the arrests. Some of those arrested have already been released and are back on the streets.
- Resident reported a catalytic converter was stolen at Saint Margaret Church.
- Resident complaints about people going in and out of a vacant house at 502 w 262nd Street. 50th Precinct stated they have investigated periodically and there are no signs of squatters or vagrancy at the location.
- Resident reported cars racing and doing doughnuts frequently at 261st Street and Spencer Avenue.
- Assistant Principal of JFK expressed concerns about youths and grown men smoking hookah, double parked cars and loud music being played on the strip leading up to the school by Tibbet Avenue and 230th Street. Female students afraid to walk in the area and are often harassed.
- 2 residents complained about excessive noise and constant disturbances from Tijuana Nights at 216 West 242nd Street. Complaints included: Excessively loud music played until 4AM almost every night causing severe sleep disruptions to residents and their children; cars regularly double-parked causing traffic congestion; intoxicated people loitering on the block; excessive littering; shouting and fights occurring in the street. Resident requested Bronx Community Board 8 contact the State Liquor Authority and area Elected Officials and recommend the business be shut down due to persistent public nuisance. Resident stated she and her neighbors have made multiple 311 calls about the business, videorecorded various disturbances, and building residents are tired of the business ruining their neighborhood and diminishing their quality of life. 50th Precinct stated they recently met with representatives of Tijuana Nights and the business is currently working with the NYC Office of Night Life to resolve issues. Committee noted Tijuana Nights has a long history of resident complaints, applied for a corporate change in June 2025, and the new Manager stated he intended to transform the business from a nightclub into a restaurant that doesn't cater to nightlife clientele. Representatives of the business also stated they had increased security measures, were committed to improving their operation and open to suggestion from the 50th Precinct and Bronx Community Board 8 on how to improve quality of life issues related to their business. The committee noted it doesn't appear any improvement measures were carried out successfully, as evidenced by ongoing complaints.
- Owner of Artizen NYC at 3700 Riverdale Avenue stated homeless people are frequenting their business, aggressively panhandling and harassing their customers.

4. FDNY Report –

Battalion Chief Martin Meaney read the FDNY statistical report.

FDNY stated they were having problems getting to emergencies and response times have increased due to more traffic caused by DOT bike lane plan continuing from 225th Street to Van Cortlandt Park South. DOT plan is also negatively affecting FDNY apparatus positioning.

FDNY states DOT's plan to make Sedgwick Avenue a one-way southbound route from Fordham Road to West 183rd Street will increase response times approximately 2-3 minutes in the BXCB8 area.

FDNY requests the Board explain to Elected Officials how the DOT proposal to make Sedgwick Avenue a one-way southbound will have a direct negative impact on FDNY response times to fires, emergencies and Certified First Responder (CFR) calls.

Public Safety Committee will discuss a possible joint resolution with BXC8 Traffic and Transportation Committee to address FDNY's concerns. T&T Chair Debby Allen was in attendance.

Due to public safety concerns, Department of Transportation (DOT) must now consult FDNY before setting up concrete barriers.

FDNY Engine 81 Ladder 46 expressed concerns about vehicles illegally parking and obstructing access to the sidewalk on Bailey Avenue and West 230th Street. The illegal parking forces pedestrians to walk into or near bike lanes to pass through the area safely. Parking enforcement needed.

5. NYS Liquor Authority (SLA): New Applications

Wine, Beer & Cider

Maria Lirano, a representative of Artizen NYC, located at 3700 Riverdale Avenue, appeared before the Public Safety Committee to apply for a new liquor license and temporary retail permit for wine, beer and cider.

Artizen NYC has been operating at this location for several years and have now decided they want to serve alcoholic beverages.

Artizen NYC is seeking a temporary retail permit, which would allow the business to fully operate in a timelier manner.

The owner signed a 2AM closing agreement.

Representatives of NYPD's 50th Precinct stated they were unaware of any prior significant disturbances or complaints at the location of this establishment.

The Public Safety Committee unanimously approved this application.

Liquor, Wine, Beer & Cider

Elizabeth Espinal, President of Yukka Latin Bistro Corp, located at 5686 Riverdale Avenue, applied to the Public Safety Committee for a new liquor license and temporary retail permit for liquor, wine, beer & cider.

Yukka Latin Bistro is an existing business that plans to expand their business and occupy the storefront adjacent to their current place of business.

Yukka Latin Bistro plans to serve liquor at a bar in both spaces, creating the need for a new liquor license at the adjacent address, as per New York State Liquor Authority guidelines.

Yukka Latin Bistro is seeking a temporary retail permit, which would allow the business to fully operate in a timelier manner.

Representatives of NYPDs 50th Precinct stated they were unaware of any prior significant disturbances or complaints at the location of this establishment.

The Public Safety Committee unanimously approved this application.

6. Old Business

Discussion: Bronx District Attorney Darcel Clark Calls for Changes to Stop Youth Gun Violence – Proposed Resolution:

The committee discussed Bronx District Attorney Darcel Clark’s suggested changes to the Raise the Age Law. Since RTA’s inception, youth gun violence has dramatically increased (<https://www.thecity.nyc/2025/12/15/raise-the-age-youth-crime-statistics/>), (<https://www.bronxda.nyc.gov/downloads/pdf/pr/2021/56-2021%20Bronx-DAClark-calls-for-Changes-Address-Youth-Gun-Violence.pdf>).

The issue was previously presented to the committee by Bronx Assistant DAs at the March Public Safety Committee meeting and a proposed resolution was discussed at the May Public Safety Committee meeting.

The committee drafted a letter of support for DA Clark’s recommendation to expand funding, services and programming to prevent youth gun violence, and for increasing services such as trauma counseling within the youth detention centers to prevent reoffending.

The letter also protested the inequitable distribution of \$1.55 billion dollars appropriated by New York State that New York City is currently ineligible to receive due to a requirement that funds be reserved for localities that adhere to a two-percent real estate tax cap.

The letter was signed by Bronx Community Board 8 Chairperson Julie Reyes and Public Safety Committee Chairperson Ed Green and was emailed to NYS Governor Hochul, NYS Senate Majority leader Stewart-Cousins, NYS Assembly Speaker Heastie, Bronx Borough President Gibson, all Bronx Community Board 8 Elected Officials and all NYC Community Boards.

The committee discussed a resolution drafted in support of Bronx District Attorney Darcel Clark’s suggested changes to the Raise the Age Law that will balance rehabilitation with public safety issues concerning gun violence and call for funding of youth services that emphasize alternatives to incarceration.

The Public Safety Committee voted unanimously to approve the resolution.

WHEREAS, representatives from the Bronx District Attorney’s office attended the March 17th, 2026, Bronx Community Board 8 Public Safety Committee meeting to address the escalation of youth gun violence in the Bronx and tragic random shooting death in Kingsbridge of 16-year-old Christopher Redding, a student at JFK High School by a 17-year-old youth; and
