1. Welcome and Introduction of Committee Members and Guests

2. Approval of the April 23, 2025 Minutes

The meeting minutes were approved unanimously

3. Chair's Report

None

4. Presentation: New York City Parks Department – Fort Independence Playground & Public Restroom Building Design

Presentation attached. Tom Balsley presented his design for the reconstruction of Fort Independence Playground. The main changes would be:

- Complete reconfiguration of the play areas
- Replacement of the restroom and moving it near the entrance gate for the park
- Restricting the flow of the playground to one 10' pathway
- Removal of many areas of Belgian block and replacing them with permeable perennial beds
- Installation of 3' fences along the running track to prevent children from running out of the playground without supervision
- Integration of the adjacent hill with the play areas
- Integration of seating and spray shower with the hill

- Replacing the historic plaques at the entrance to the park
- Replacing the restroom with a larger, 720 square foot building with more bathroom stalls, more sinks and a larger storage area for Parks tools. The restroom would have a green roof.
- Re-grading the park to prevent water runoff
- Five trees would be removed due to poor condition

The design of the project is expected to be completed by next summer. They anticipate one year for procurement and two years for construction. Expected completion by Summer 2029.

Overall, there was appreciation for the upgrades to the park. Concerns were:

- The position of the restroom blocks view into the playground from the street
- The area currently covered with Belgian block which would be converted to large perennial beds is heavily used for birthday parties. This functionality would be lost.
- 1' fencing near some playground areas may be a trip hazard
- Kousa dogwood near the playground would leave natural debris on the play surface
- The entrance walkway to the playground is only 10' and would also serve as the only point of access for the restrooms. It seems too narrow.
- There would only be one pathway into the playground which make access harder from the Gouverneur entrance
- The plant list has many shrubs that are non-native including barberry which is considered invasive
- The park would not be accessible from this end during the two-year construction project

There was a request to also consider removing the gravel running track and integrate that space into the playground. Parks stated that the track is not in scope and it would not be practical to partially remove it.

The Parks Department requested a resolution of support from the committee for the designs to proceed. A vote on the resolution was deferred by the chair to the October 22nd committee meeting in order to allow the public time to review the design.

5. Presentation: North Riverdale Baseball and Softball League request for lighting in Sid Augarten Ballfield

The North Riverdale Baseball and Softball League presented their request for lights to be installed on the Sid Augarten Ballfield (AKA Sid Ballfield). Presentation attached. North Riverdale Baseball and Softball League is a nonprofit baseball league that enables elementary, middle school and high school student to play baseball and softball without the high cost of participating in for-profit travel leagues. They currently play at Sid Field, Caryl Field and Kelly Field, but are at capacity given the number of games they need to play to accommodate demand and the amount of sunlight during after-school hours and on the weekend. Their games begin at 5:30pm due to parent schedules which prevents them from adjusting their playing schedule to accommodate the early sunset. Sid Field is the primary location for their little league games and is the most impacted by the sunlight issue because of the high demand for little league. North Riverdale Baseball and Softball League is the incumbent renewing permit holder for Sid Field which means they are the sole permit holder and care for the field which is locked when they are not playing. In the spring, they had 36 teams and in

the fall could only field 22 teams due to limited sunlight during late October and November, particularly after Daylight Savings Time ends. During the spring, from April through June, they play on weekends and during the week after school. During the fall, from September through November, they play only on weekends. Games generally last an hour and a half to two hours. Their weeknight games generally go until 8:30pm. They have no amplified sound. Approximately 50 people attend each game including players, coaches and parents.

They have requested funding from New York State Senator Gustavo Rivera to run power to the ballpark from Vinmont Veterans Park which is adjacent to the field. The little league says they also have the support of Council Member Eric Dinowitz. The Parks Department has requested a letter of support from the community board before they will assemble the cost estimate. The league need the lighting in order to provide enough teams for everyone who would like to play little league to be able to play. They have already collected 489 signatures in support of the lighting and have letters of support from local businesses like Earlybird and from the Riverdale Neighborhood House. Ideally, they would like to be able to play from Mid-March to Mid-November on weekends and during the week until 8:30pm.

Twenty-three residents who live across the street or nearby signed a petition opposing lights on Sid Field and several of them attended the meeting to speak in opposition. Their concerns are:

- Double parking on Moshulu Avenue from the games would block traffic
- High speed driving on Moshulu Avenue is dangerous for children
- The money would be better spent on fields that are high school/adult league size
- Glare from the lights would be visible in their homes at night

Questions raised:

Are there other ballfields in our district that have lighting? – Cooney Grauer field is the only ballfield that has lighting.

How much would this cost and what are our options for lighting? Katherine Borrome could not provide estimates or options without more study. There are lighting units now for this purpose that are very focused and have less glare than past models, however, it was unclear if Parks is able to acquire these units or has experience with them.

The chair deferred a vote in order to research the issues that were raised. The committee will have the office research the following concerns:

- Discuss with Parks if the lights can be programmed to only be on when games are happening and to turn off at 9pm
- The league already plays until 8:30pm in the spring. Have there been any issues?
- What options does the community have for lights?
- Does Parks have any similar lighting anywhere else and what has been their experience with it?
- Are there other little leagues that are having the same capacity issues and also need lights or field improvements?

Further discussion will occur at the October 22, 2025 Parks Committee meeting

6. Discussion: FY27 and FY28 Budget Priorities

Chair discussed the budget process for the committee with new members. The chair invites all members of the community to attend the January committee meeting with suggestions of park initiatives that need funding. The committee budget priorities for FY27 are attached.

6. Old Business

Park Pathway South of Palisade Pumping Station – the horticultural work around the new pumping station at Palisade Avenue is complete. As part of this work, they replaced the split rail fence and rebuilt the walking path along Palisade Avenue. David Gellman asked if reconstruction of this path could continue further south on Palisade Avenue as much of it is washed out. The board office will investigate which agency would be responsible for this and if it would be a capital or expense priority.

Wave Hill Water Management At Palisade Avenue/Spaulding Lane – the cobblestone swale along the Wave Hill property is in poor condition. When Wave Hill attended the Parks Committee meeting last spring, they said they were reviewing this as part of their water runoff management planning. Do they have a plan to address this issue yet? Chair will have the office reach out.

Palisade Avenue at Half Moon Overlook – Planting bed is in poor condition. Is it DOT property? Can it be adopted by Parks? Parks does not generally take on new property and do not have gardeners. We believe this property is owned by DOT and that gardens on it are being managed by volunteers.

Henry Hudson Park Vandalism – trees are still being damaged by individuals who live in the area. Friends of Spuyten Duyvil are working with the city agencies, but the requirements before agencies will write a violation are ineffective and frustrating.

Friends of Spuyten Duyvil Upcoming Events – City of Forest Day, October 4th. Events in Henry Hudson Park 10-noon; Spuyten Duyvil Shorefront Park 1-3pm; Spuyten Duyvil Library 10am-5pm; Kappock Street Garden 10-5pm.

Riverdale Farmers Market Alternative Sites – The Riverdale Farmers Market is looking for alternate sites. Daniel Nunez asked about the process for holding a farmers market in Marble Hill Playground. Information on acquiring the necessary permits can be found here:



Fort Independence Playground | Site Analysis Diagram
















