Chair Padernacht called the meeting to order at 7:32pm and introduced guests.

1) Stephanie Coggins (On behalf of sponsors: Along the Hudson Homeowners Association, Spuyten Duyvil Neighborhood Coalition, Kingsbridge Historical Society and Friends of Spuyten Duyvil) made a presentation to the Committee concerning two requests:

- Street co-naming of Bradley Terrace between Palisade Avenue and Edsall Avenue to include the name "John J. McKelvey, Sr." on the mapped street.
- Street co-naming of Palisade Avenue between Independence Avenue and Edsall Avenue to include the name "Villa Rosa Bonheur Terrace" on the mapped street.
- Brochures highlighting details of the proposal, including noteworthy historical references, were handed out to Committee Members and is attached hereto.
- Stephanie Coggins thanked members of the McKelvey family. She stated this experience has inspired a groundswell of community activism and hoped this type of neighborhood involvement would continue against future developers seeking to remove historical architectural sites.
- A letter from Sherida E. Paulsen, Chair of the Riverdale Nature Preservancy, was read and presented to the Committee, voicing their support for the proposal.
- Jodie Colon, of Friends of Spuyten Duyvil, stated she wanted to publically acknowledge and endorse the resolutions.
- Guest, Jim Wacker of the Coalition of Brust Park stated he wanted to sign his organization on to support the resolution.
- Committee Member David Gellman stated he was concerned about developers using the Villa Rosa Bonheur name as a marketing tool to enhance the desirability of their development project.
- Guest, S. Jesselson stated The Riverdale Press and community residents would widely publicize any unscrupulous promotional activities the developer engaged in.

Chair Dan Padernacht proposed the following resolution for consideration of the street co-naming for <u>James J. McKelvey, Sr.</u>:

WHEREAS, John J. McKelvey, Sr. died on October 19, 1947 and this resolution is brought more than two years after his death; and

WHEREAS, John J. McKelvey, Sr. has been nominated for the honor of this proposed street co-naming by Along the Hudson Homeowners Association;
Bronx Council for Environmental Quality; Friends of Spuyten Duyvil;
Kingsbridge Historical Society; the Spuyten Duyvil Neighborhood Coalition;
Riverdale Nature Preservancy; and the Coalition to Save Brust Park;

WHEREAS, John J. McKelvey, Sr. has shown his creativity, and helped mold the landscape of the Borough of the Bronx and the City of New York, specifically the Spuyten Duyvil area; and

WHEREAS, John J. McKelvey, Sr., John J. McKelvey — a lawyer, writer and developer, who also was the first editor-in-chief of the *Harvard Law Review*, was alarmed by the wave of high-rise development spreading through New York City at the time, decided to construct cooperative apartments resembling villas as part of the famous "City Beautiful" movement of the early twentieth century, notably the Rosa Bonheur, Charlotte Brontë and Victoria; and

WHEREAS, John J. McKelvey Sr. acted as the secretary and director of the two entities -Along-the-Hudson Company and the Edgehill Terrace Company, whose development footprints are still apparent today; as attorney for the Edgehill Co-Operative Savings & Loan Association; member of the Contracts and Bronx, and Executive Committees of the Hudson–Fulton Celebration Commission of 1909; as secretary of the Henry Hudson Monument Committee of 1909; as founding

member, trustee and incorporator of the Edgehill Church, and as trustee of the Barnard School for Boys (now part of Horace Mann School).

WHEREAS, John J. Mckelvey, Sr. also served as attorney, secretary and trustee of the Park District Protective League (PDFL) which took on a preservationist role in Riverdale, one example being Riverdale Park, which was created by the contributions of landowners convinced by the PDPL of the need to protect the green space from the encroaching development of the city; In the 1950's, the PDPL became the Riverdale Community Planning Association<sup>16</sup>, which went on to champion the rezoning of Riverdale and the environmental protections of the first SNAD regulations; Without the stewardship and influence of John McKelvey, Sr. in early years, it is quite possible that Riverdale would have a different landscape;

WHEREAS, John J. Mckelvey, Sr. had such an influence on the modern development of the Spuyten Duyvil community which resonates today in the picturesque tranquility of our green space and our sustained commitment to a planned and balanced community; and

WHEREAS, the evidence and testimony presented to Bronx Community Board No. 8 has demonstrated that John J. McKelvey, Sr. has benefited a cross-section of Bronx Community Board No. 8 and the Borough of the Bronx and the City of New York;

WHEREAS, this street has a specific connection to John J. McKelvey, Sr. as it is the location of Villa Rosa Bonheur, one of McElvey's unique designs; and

WHEREAS, the name change will not engender confusion as there are no other streets with similar name in the vicinity;

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that Bradley Terrace between Palisade Avenue and Edsall Avenue be co-named **John J. McKelvey, Sr. Way.**

- Chair Dan Padernacht proposed the following resolution for consideration of the street co-naming for Villa Rosa Bonheur:

WHEREAS, John J. McKelvey, Sr. has been nominated for the honor of this proposed street co-naming by Along the Hudson Homeowners Association;
Bronx Council for Environmental Quality; Friends of Spuyten Duyvil;
Kingsbridge Historical Society; the Spuyten Duyvil Neighborhood Coalition;
Riverdale Nature Preservancy; and the Coalition to Save Brust Park;

WHEREAS, Villa Rosa Bonheur was built in 1924 as a co-operative by John J.

McKelvey — a lawyer, writer and developer, who also was the first editor-inchief of the *Harvard Law Review*, Villa Rosa Bonheur has been a beloved

landmark of the neighborhood, located at 2395 Palisade Avenue in the Spuyten Duyvil section of Riverdale, in the Bronx.

WHEREAS, Villa Rosa Bonheur was perched at the top of the Bradley Terrace step street, she has been etched into the landscape of the community for 96 years; Every commuter descending the fieldstone and winding stair case or driving by in a Raillink bus, has gazed upon her charming exterior clad in stucco, with its red Spanish tile roofs, steep, pitched roofs and balconies off of individual apartments; She was the first of John McKelvey's multi-family homes and exceedingly unique from any other homes of its kind in New York City; and

WHEREAS, Villa Rosa looked like no other apartment house of its day, in McKelvey's vision, Villa Rosa Bonheur would exude charm and be a design for living, rather than the brick tenements of little distinction mushrooming all over the Borough of the Bronx at the turn of the twentieth century;

WHEREAS; Villa Rosa Bonheur's architect was Robert W. Gardner, a famous and visionary pioneer of the use of reinforced concrete in residential buildings;

**WHEREAS,** Villa Rosa Bonheur was named after Rosa Bonheur, widely thought of as one of the most famous female artists of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, Rosa Bonheur was renowned for her exceptional ability to paint animals with insight into their

characters and psyches with her paintings hanging in museums around the world, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art in NYC; and

WHEREAS, Villa Rosa Bonheur is included in *The Architectural and Historical Resources of Riverdale, The Bronx, New York A Preliminary Survey* (Oct. 1998) published by the Riverdale Nature Preservancy;

WHEREAS, Villa Rosa Bonheur is an influence on the modern development of the Spuyten Duyvil community which resonates today in the picturesque tranquility of our green space and our sustained commitment to a planned and balanced community; and

WHEREAS, the evidence and testimony presented to Bronx Community Board No. 8 has demonstrated that the architectural influence of Villa Rosa Bonheur has benefited a cross-section of Bronx Community Board No. 8 and the Borough of the Bronx and the City of New York;

WHEREAS, this street has a specific connection to Villa Rosa Bonheur as it is the building's location; and

**WHEREAS**, the name change will not engender confusion as there are no other streets with similar name in the vicinity;

## THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Palisade Avenue between Bradley

Terrace and Edsall Avenue be co-named Villa Rosa Bonheur Way.

- Jim Wacker inquired as to what residents could do to prevent developers from demolishing more historical sites.

- Chair Padernacht stated Mr. Wacker's inquiry should be addressed more thoroughly within the BX CB8 Land Use Committee.
- Jodie Colon stated she asked the developer if they would install a commemorative plaque but has not yet received a response from them.
- Miguel Hummel stated it would be a disservice to the community if the street was not properly named.
- Stephanie Coggins stated that, ideally, she would like the landing to be named.
- Patrick Hill, Representative for NYC Councilman Andrew Cohen's office, stated streets were named twice a year and he would find out what dates the naming would occur and relay the information to the Board.
- 2) Discussion of proposal to modify the enhanced crosswalks on Hudson Manor Terrace at W. 236<sup>th</sup> Street, West 237<sup>th</sup> Street and West 239<sup>th</sup> Street was postponed, as per Chair Padernacht.
- 3) Chair Padernacht gave a report on the working group which was created to discuss modifications to the enhanced crosswalks installed by NYC Department of Transportation on Palisade Avenue and Kappock Street. Chair Padernacht reported that the working group is comprised of Traffic & Transportation Chair Dan Padernacht, Board Chair Rosemary Ginty and neighborhood residents Robert Harrington, Mary Selli and Lew Wunderlich. Chair Padernacht stated that the group has already met and is working towards possible alternatives.

#### 4) Approval of December Minutes

Committee Member David Gellman requested a change to the December 19<sup>th</sup> 2019 minutes and submitted a statement he claims more accurately reflects his words. Mr. Gellman's proposed changes are as follows:

From: "Committee Member David Gellman stated that east to west bus service was not addressed."

To: "T&T Committee Member David Gellman noted: During MTA's outreach, CB8 resident's voiced key concerns about East-West bus service, especially connecting to subway lines, yet none of MTA bus plans addressed this service shortfall. Incredibly, MTA cutbacks eliminate pick-ups while busses make "deadhead" return runs to position themselves for rush hour service."

Minutes for the December 19<sup>th</sup> 2019 Traffic and Transportation Committee meeting were approved unanimously.

#### 5) New Business

- Guest Jim Wacker inquired about the ULURP process, with regards to removing a portion of the 242<sup>nd</sup> Street area from DOT's jurisdiction.
- Chair Padernacht stated he wants DOT to explain to the community what happens to the development of a street when a retaining wall is built adjacent to it.
- Jim Wacker asked what specific individual makes the final decision determining a ULURP.
- Patrick Hill, Representative for NYC Councilman Andrew Cohen's office, stated he would try to get the information Mr. Wacker requested.
- Committee Member David Gellman stated Amtrack trains were blowing their horns loudly at night, causing a disturbance in the neighborhood while people were sleeping. Mr. Gellman inquired why the trains have to do this.
- Committee Member Ed Green stated he is employed as a Train Operator and trains generally blow their horns for various safety sensitive reasons including equipment testing.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:53pm.



"The Commission is interested in putting the building on its calendar for consideration as a potential city landmark."


"A complexly massed stone and stucco multi-family residence in the form of a large country house, the property served as a template for the Villa Charlotte Bronte located nearby." (July 24, 2018)

"The exterior appears beautifully intact." (Statement of Significance, August 20, 2018)

"It may merit consideration as a potential landmark," said Landmarks Preservation Commission spokeswoman Zodet Negrón, after the agency evaluated the villa. "Unfortunately, permits had already been issued that allowed for the removal of significant exterior features for which the building was being considered." (Riverdale Press, September 30, 2018)




# EDGEHILL TERRACE 1914 AND 2020




